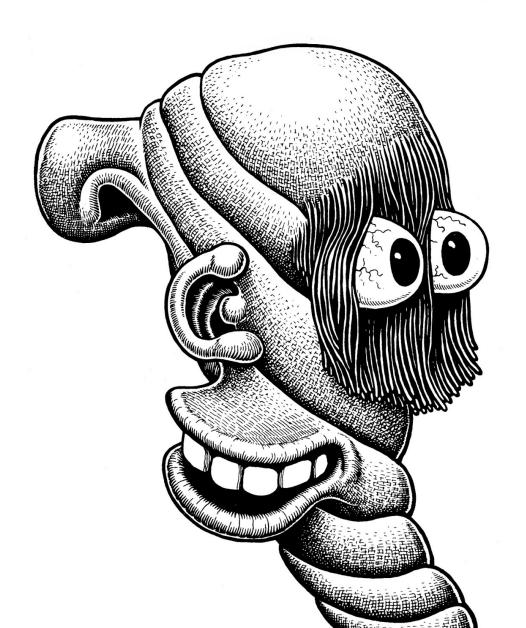
# **OVERVIEW**

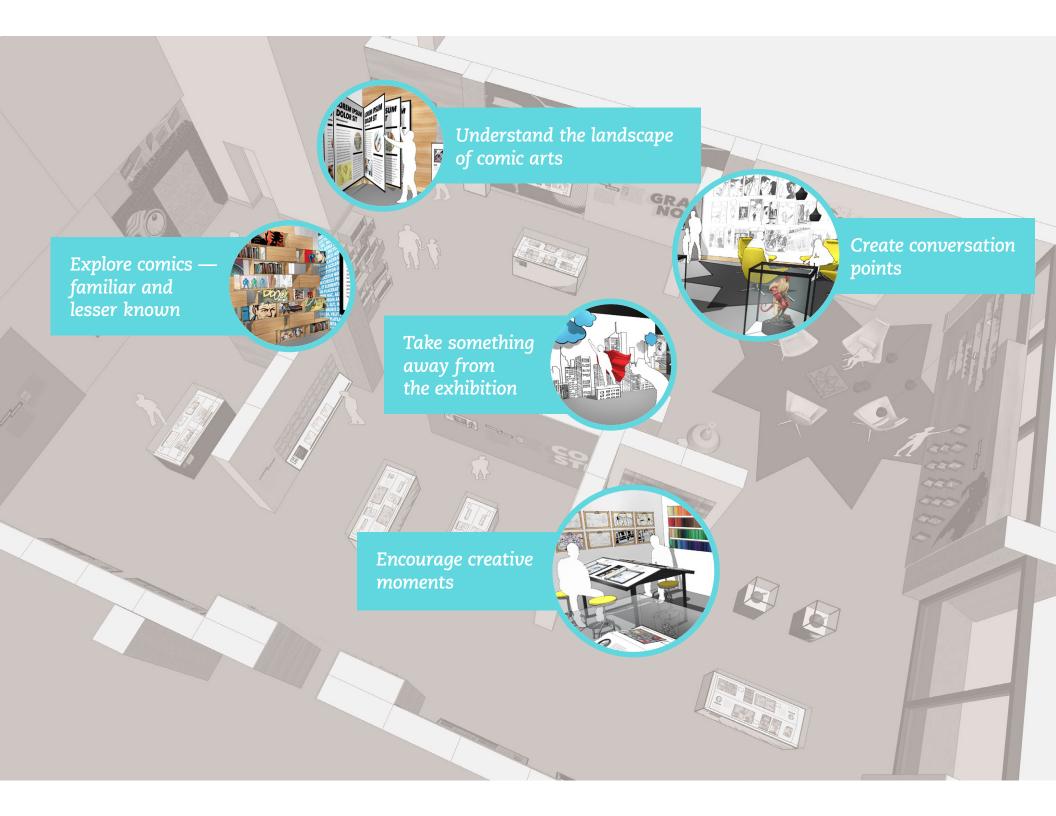
# **EXHIBITION GOALS**

## **NEW DIRECTION**

Comic City, U.S.A. departs from past exhibitions. The content of comics provides the perfect opportunity to break away from expected treatments in favor of fresh design approaches with energy and edge.

# THE EXPERIENCE

## CONTENT

Artists across four genres will be featured — political cartoons, comic strips, comic books, and graphic novels. Several works by each artist will be on display along with stories that highlight the artists' connections to Oregon. Other artifacts, like artist tools, memorabilia, or favorite objects enhance the exhibition and give visitors and fans a glimpse into these artists' lives.

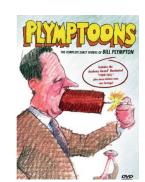

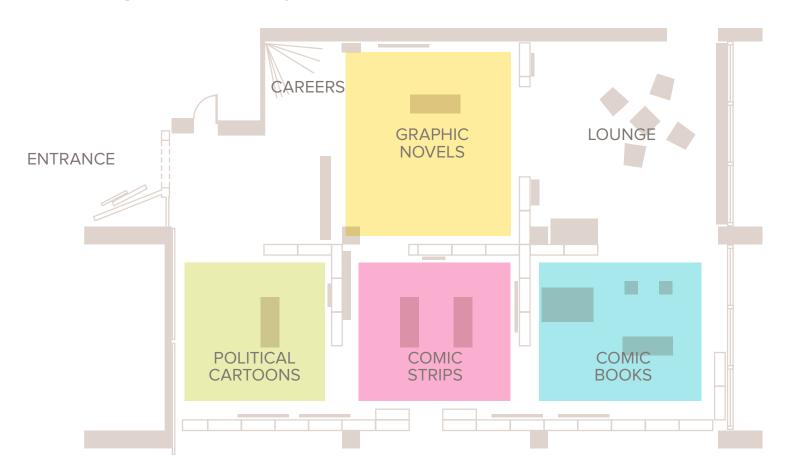

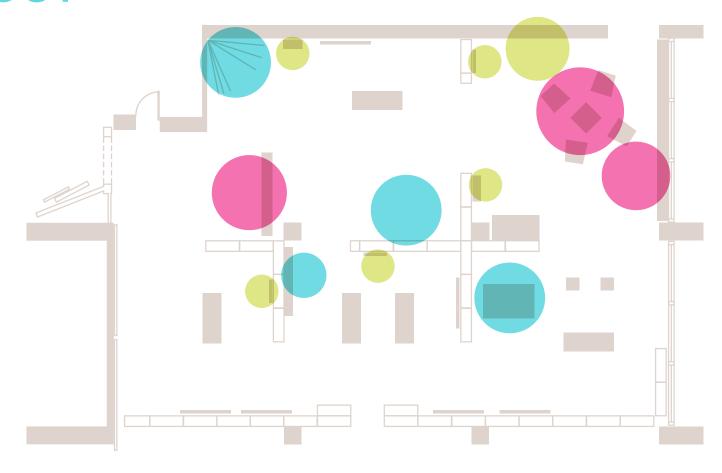


## **LAYOUT**

The open floorplan allows visitors to explore directed by their own interests and curiosity. Moving from one genre to the next, visitors learn about different types of comic art. Walls reminiscent of open books introduce each area, unfolding its unique style.

## **DIGITAL EXPERIENCES**

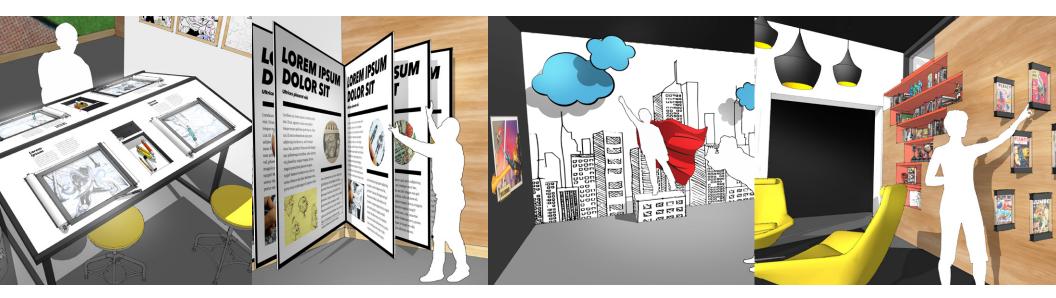
Video kiosks and computer-based interactives bring technology into the space and allow for deeper content exploration.

# **VISUAL INSPIRATION**



The exhibition's visual design blends old-school comic halftone textures and shapes with new-school color palettes and fresh expressions. Bright, irreverent, and contemporary, the look and feel is fun, unexpected, and a bit edgy.

## **INTERACTIVES & ACTIVITIES**



## **POSSIBLE EXPERIENCES**

- » Create your own comics with templates, pencils, and trace paper at a multi-person light table.
- » Go behind the scenes and explore the diverse careers in the comic arts highlighted on a large-scale comic book.
- » Put yourself in the frame with a comic photo op; post your photo to social media.

# **DIGITAL INTERACTIVES**



## **POSSIBLE EXPERIENCES**

- » Queue and view videos with perspectives from different artists (one per genre).
- » Choose a comic, add your caption, and submit. Selected comics are displayed on adjacent projection wall for all visitors to enjoy.
- » Explore web comics at a touch screen station.

## **DETAILS**



Simple cabinetry and minimalist mounting elevates artists' work without distraction. Textural graphics — like cross-hatching and half-tone dot printing — applied to OHS's existing casework creates an integrated aesthetic. Acrylic cases posted off walls display books in unexpected ways: both front and back are featured. Shelving and cabinets allow visitors to peruse books and artwork that can be handled library-style.

# THE DESIGN

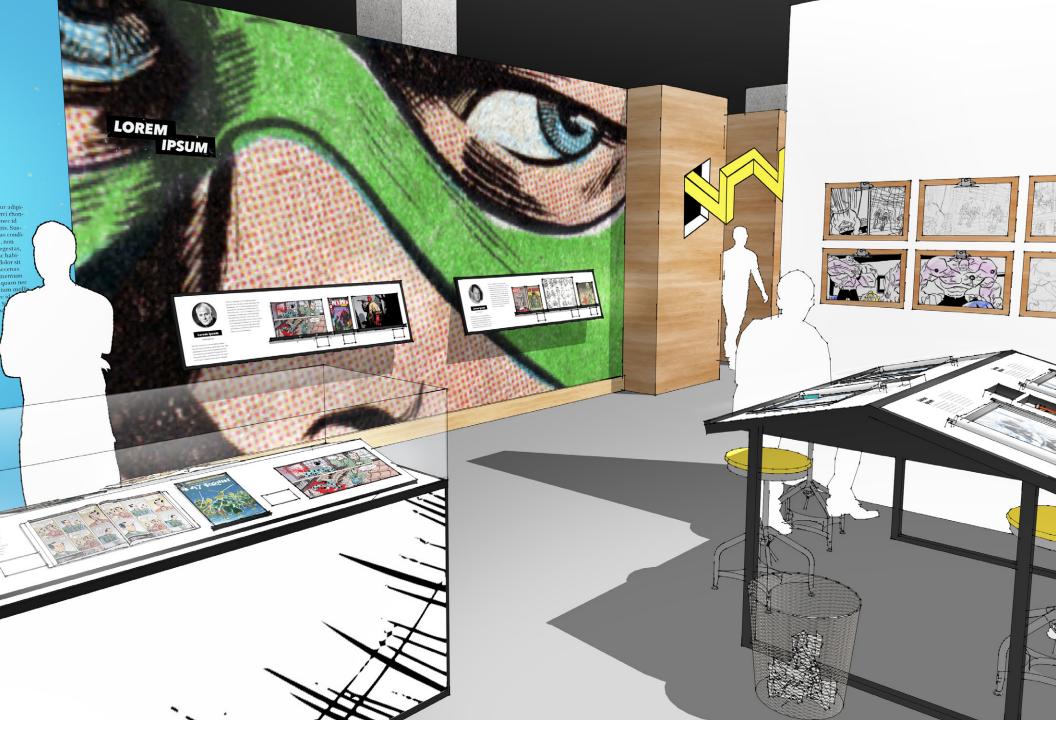


**ENTRY** — A large, dimensional entry graphic leads with a *POW*! Behind, visitors will find stacks of comics waiting to be explored in a vibrant exhibit space.





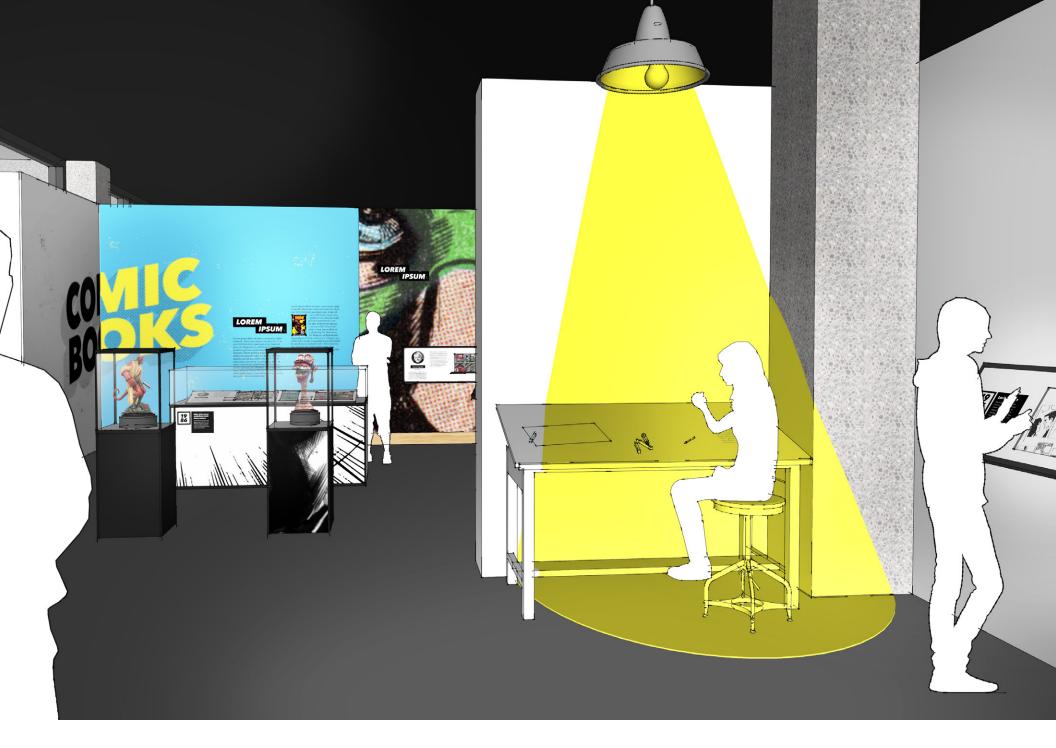
**COMIC STRIPS** – Artifacts in the foreground are supported by a storyboarding activity where visitors draw frames to create a collective strip.



**COMIC BOOKS** – Rich with artifacts from four featured artists, this area also includes a light table where visitors can practice a variety of drawing techniques and create cartoons.



**CREATIVITY STATION** – At multi-user light tables, visitors flex their creative skills by drawing their own comics. Nearby the lounge area provides a comfortable space to read and relax, comic book in-hand.



**DRAFTING TABLE** – A playful take on a familiar workstation, this vibrant drafting desk provides visitors with a moment to "step inside the book" as they explore the tools of the comic artist.



**PHOTO OP** – Become the super hero! The photo op area allows visitors to snap themselves posing as the stars of their own comic and post it to social media.



CAREERS & CONCLUSION – Taking visitors behind the scenes, an oversized comic book highlights careers and skills of people working in the comic arts.

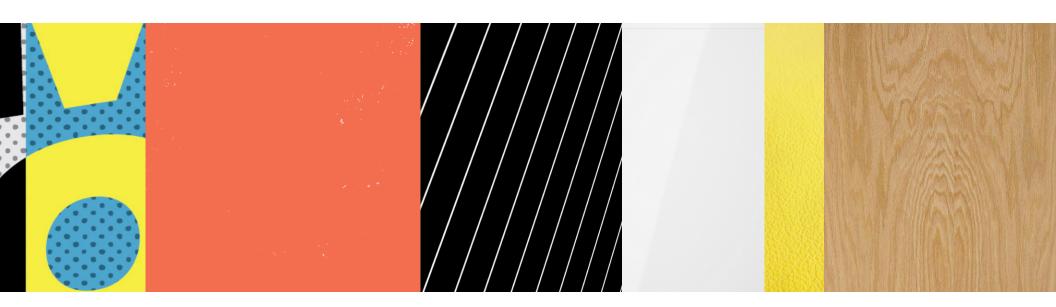
An adjacent kiosk allows visitors to explore the newest genre; web comics.





## **MATERIALS**

Inspired by comics and comic book shops, the exhibit materials are honest and energized. Working within the existing palette of floor treatments and adjacencies, the exhibit adds plywood surfaces and lively, painterly colors. Casework is treated with comic textures. Patina on walls and graphic textures provide the familiarity of a well-worn book, while layering provides opportunities for clever details.

## **COLOR**

The comic-inspired palette pairs colors in fresh and unexpected combinations, creating a playful, modern feel.

## **TYPOGRAPHY**

Ultra bold italic 3D type pays homage to comic book title art, adding expressive energy to the space. A modern serif font adds texture and balance.

# **GRAPHICS**

## **DESIGN MOTIFS**

Panel-inspired black and white borders, vintage comic halftones, and graphic patterns make visitors feel like they're inside a comic. A subtle textured patina is added to large color fields evoking the worn feel of a well-loved comic book.

## **IMAGES**

Artifact images will be produced in color. Artist portraits and supporting images will be treated in black and white halftones to achieve a uniform look and mask potential asset issues (e.g. low resolution).



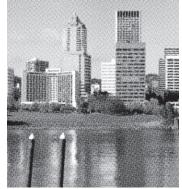


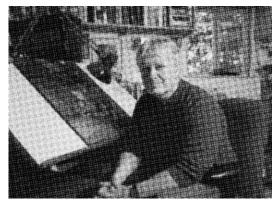












# **GRAPHIC TREATMENTS**

#### **GENRE TITLES**

Bold statements that distinguish genre areas within the space.



#### **HEADERS & DISPLAY LABELS**

Treatment for wall headlines and large-scale attribution (e.g. artist work used as wall art, etc.).



#### **BIOS**

Treatment for artist portraits and profile content.

Joe Sacco (born October 2, 1960) is a Maltese-American cartoonist and journalist. He is best known for his comics journalism, in particular in the books Palestine (1996) and Footnotes in Gaza (2009), on Israeli-Palestinian relations; and Safe Area Goražde (2000) and The Fixer (2003) on the Bosnian War. #### **PLACARDS**

Bold titles entice visitors to read more about the artifacts; explanatory text is set in serif type for easy reading.

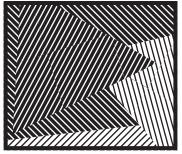
